

Ephesians: From Death to Life
Life at Home and Work
Ephesians 6:1-9

As humanity continues to rebel against our Creator's principles for families and for work, we will find that our homes and workplaces often become the scenes of our most obvious failings and flaws. They can become not only dysfunctional but also deeply unhappy places. So, when Christ took on flesh to save us, by living our Christian life for us, he was born into the family of a workman to live perfectly by the principles of our Creator. And when he died in our place for our sins, he was punished for all our weakness and wickedness, at home and at work, so that we can be forgiven and seek his strength to change.

1. The gospel is revealed in children that honor and obey.
2. The gospel is revealed in parents that nurture and teach.
3. The gospel is revealed in workers that are honest and diligent.
4. The gospel is revealed in bosses that are fair and equitable.

No work is merely work. Work is a way to serve Christ. As believers, we have been raised from death to life. We have been saved by grace through the finished work of Christ and his cross. We now have the indwelling power and presence of the Holy Spirit. Maybe, just maybe, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" should be seen in our attitudes at work not just on our coffee cups. Maybe that verse is intended to help us live out the gospel in the workplace and find meaning and purpose in the way we make a living.

Reflection
